Stories from Home: a community-based arts research approach to place-making an place-based stigma

This presentation overviews a recent pilot project, funded by a University of Melbourne interdisciplinary seed grant, where artist-researchers located a creative research intervention at the site of social housing estate in West Heidelberg. Broadly, this participatory research engaged residents to explore on-the-ground interactions with space, place and community in a 'stigmatised' neighbourhood. Working closely with residents and in partnership with local organizations and stakeholders, a collaborative

approach was developed. An interdisciplinary, ethnographic and participatory-arts method was employed to articulate creative methodology for enhancing the potential for social change and connection within neighbourhoods affected by place-based stigma through a reflexive and dialogic praxis. This open ended approach and its emergent methodology (understood as situational and relational in terms of aesthetics and analysis) will be discussed, along with related creative and research outcomes.

James Oliver is a Research Fellow at the McCaughey Centre, University of Melbourne. He was awarded his PhD in 2003 from the University of Sheffield. Since then, James has been engaged in a range of projects covering anthropological and cultural research, arts development and practice.

Marnie Badham is an artist researcher from Canada, soon to complete her practice led PhD at the Centre for Cultural Partnerships and McCaughey Centre. Her work is interested in representational and relational processes within arts intervention, community organizing and cultural policy development.

Evaluating Community Wellbeing and Cultural Policy: From Theory to Practice

Emma Blomkamp, PhD candidate, VCAM and University of Auckland,

How can we understand the role of local government in the cultural life of a community, let alone measure the impacts of its policies and programmes in this area? Not only is a common definition of culture hard to come by, but a myriad of other actors and agencies are involved in cultural activities and shape community outcomes. Assessing progress towards abstract goals such as community cohesion and cultural vitality is certainly less than straightforward. This presentation outlines PhD research that investigates how local governments in Australia and New Zealand respond to these challenges. In particular, it asks whether the discourse of community wellbeing and the development of community indicators offer useful tools for evaluating cultural policy outcomes. After outlining some international theories and local examples, Emma will be interested to hear from other researchers and those who have worked in cultural development or local government to find out about their understanding and experience of relevant monitoring, reporting and evaluation frameworks.
