Dear colleagues,

This month CDN has been involved in a number of interesting projects;

Getting It Right: Community Consent and the Arts forum on June 9, held in partnership with the City of Melbourne, and the Torch. At this half-day event, participants heard from a range of artists and artworkers about their experiences obtaining informed consent from community members involved in arts projects. Speakers included filmmaker Rebecca McLean. and her experiences with indigenous communities. Jemma Mead from Merri Community Health Services described the ten year history of Y-Glam Youth Performing Arts Project and the competence that has in dealing with informed consent for young people coming out as gay.

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Community Consent and the Arts report

This forum was the final stage of a research project on the topic of informed consent, the arts and communities. Pia Smith undertook recently for CDN. VicHealth commissioned the project to assist arts project leaders to implement affirming and effective processes for obtaining consent with participating communities. VicHealth had identified that consent is particularly important and challenging for communities at risk, and especially in contemporary times with new forms of arts media available leading to greater exposure for program participants. The final report is now available, providing a comprehensive annotated bibliography on resources related to community consent, and findings of a consultation process with a number of researchers, artists and artworkers.

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Arts Indicators for local government

CDN has been working for some time on the development of a framework for indicators for arts in local government. This month, we held two roundtable meetings to discuss this draft framework. These discussions were well attended by local government cultural development workers, and others from metro and regional Victoria. Overall the feeling was that progression towards a framework of indicators for the arts for local government is a good idea and that the framework presented was promising. There is much work still to do on the detail before the paper is presented formally to a wider group. 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Just published: Report: Picture This: increasing the cultural participation of people with a disability in Victoria. This research report was commissioned by the Office for Disability, Arts Victoria and Disability Services Division to examine ways that participation of people with a disability in the arts could be increased. CDN undertook the literature review and community consultations in 2008, and is pleased that the findings are now available publicly.

Part 1: Literature Review summarizes the national and international literature around arts and disability participation, Part 2: Research Findings provides information about the arts participation experiences of people in Victoria as described by individuals with a disability and service providers through a series of interviews and focus group. These reports provide a unique snapshot of a dynamic and burgeoning Victorian arts and disability sector, and also identify some of the barriers that need to be addressed. They offer ideas, suggestions and possible strategies for increasing the cultural participation of people with a disability, relevant to both government and community.

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New artists' resale royalty scheme announced!

The Australian government has launched a new artists' resale royalty scheme. Under the new scheme: commercial resales of artworks must be reported; and a 5% royalty is payable on some resales.

Key features of the scheme:

It applies to resales of existing as well as new works;

It applies to a range of original artworks, included limited edition prints authorised by the artist;

It does not apply to a private sale from one individual to another;

A royalty is not payable on the first change of hands after 9 June, but all resales must be reported;

A royalty is not payable on resales for under \$1,000; the scheme will be extended to artworks from countries that have similar schemes.

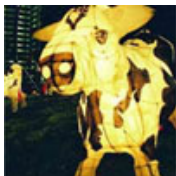
