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Conference: Culture: A New Way of Thinking for Local Government: report and proceedings now available

The highlight of the year was the recent conference, **Culture: A New Way of Thinking for Local Government** held in Melbourne in October. We were delighted to have the participation of delegates from across Australia and the Asia-Pacific, sharing knowledge and ideas about the potential for the role of culture in local government.

Highlights include presentations by keynote speaker Eduard Miralles, the Cultural Relations Advisor at the Barcelona Provincial Council, on the *UCLG Policy Statement on Culture 2010: what does it mean for local government?* [Listen to audio](#). Setting Up a Community-Managed Not-For-Profit Organisation

Council community development workers have a long history of facilitating community development and planning, consistently seeking to engage better with communities around decision-making relevant to local needs. Often this has implications for the balance struck between formal service provision and local community-led initiatives. Sometimes, the best way to ensure that groups exist to provide child care, preserve local history or start a sports team is to support local people to take on these roles themselves through the creation of small, community-owned organisations. To help guide this process, the Office for the Community Sector in partnership with Community Child Care has developed a guide to Setting Up a Community-Managed Not-For-Profit Organisation. This new publication clearly lays out the steps involved in establishing a new not-for-profit organisation and details the community development benefits which flow from locally-managed groups.
