From the office

Dear colleagues

This month at CDN there's been lots going on. We have been pleased to host international visitors for our recent one day conference on Culture and Local Government, a Researchers' Network meeting that focussed on peace-building through the arts and meetings to kick-start our next conference, Making Culture Count: Rethinking measures of cultural vitality, wellbeing and citizenship.

This one day conference was held in the Melbourne Town Hall, and organized in partnership with UCLG-ASPAC (United Cities and Local Governments Asia-Pacific region). This event focused on promoting the recent Policy Statement on Culture made by the international peak body for local government, United Cities and Local Governments. This statement, adopted in November 2010, declared culture as the fourth pillar of sustainable development for local government. If fully implemented, this policy would ensure that the cultural dimension is considered in all aspects of local government's work. This focus on culture as an intrinsic and vital part of the work of all government has been CDN's main platform since our inauguration in 2001. We were delighted to enjoy the opportunity to promote the idea to almost 200 delegates from across the Asia-Pacific, with the backing of the international peak body, UCLG, and support from the Municipal Association of Victoria, the Australian Local Government Association, the City of Melbourne, Arts Victoria, DPCD and Local Government Victoria.

The conference was attended by a diverse mix; Australians from Victoria and other states, as well as senior local government representatives from our international neighbours including the Solomon Islands, Indonesia, Vietnam, Korea, Japan, Pakistan, India, New Zealand and Bangladesh. Keynote speaker Eduard Miralles came from Barcelona to share his experience of the development of this Policy Statement. Other speakers from Australia and overseas provided their interpretation of culture, and the meaning of cultural development in their own context. Feedback from delegates indicated that overall they found the event very useful and interesting, and they recognized the potential for the policy statement to assist them in promotion and valuing of the cultural dimension of governance. As a result, we hope to see significant positive focus on the cultural dimension over the next few years.

Video-as-process: experiments in thinking with a video camera

The idea of 'walking with video', according to Sarah Pink, implies an engagement with a 'world in progress' (Pink, 2007, 249) which is constantly being reshaped both in the imagination and through human action. Videomaking for Pink becomes a process which gathers together people, things, sensory and embodied experiences in and along complex and intricate paths of meaning-making in movement and in place. Here, audiovisual media is a generator of meaning and knowledge – one which finds itself in the gesture of its own unfolding. Video-as-process opens up ways of thinking about video which can explore questions of becoming: through entanglement with the medium (for the researcher and the research subject), we may begin to reveal something of ourselves and our place in the world. Drawing on some of Sarah Pink's recent work on sensory ethnography and video, I will reflect on my own experiments in video-as-process (or process video) as part of my fieldwork exploring questions of voice with long-term caravan park residents living on Melbourne's urban fringes. Poppy de Souza is a community-based artsworker and creative researcher currently undertaking a practice-led PhD at the Centre for Cultural Partnerships at the University of Melbourne. Her research is focused on questions of voice and process for populations living on the social, cultural or political fringes of society.

Researchers and other interested people are welcome to join us, and learn about Poppy's very interesting work. The meetings are always followed by informal networking over drinks in Haiy Little Sista, the bar underneath CH2 building. Join us then too!

National Cultural Policy Consultation

The Federal Government are inviting contributions to the development of National Cultural Policy for Australia. They seek responses from the Australian community to examine how the Australian Government should support arts and culture in the 21st century, and to consider significant changes to the way we work, enjoy and participate in Australia's arts and cultural life. They provide a **discussion paper** to elicit ideas.

The Cultural Development Network is making a contribution to the consultation. We offer three main points;

- that a cultural perspective is not a stand-alone objective, but that it should be used to frame all decision-making of governments, along with social, economic and environmental dimensions
- that increasing participation in the arts should be a priority goal, with local government a key potential driver of this
- that Australia needs policy initiatives that put us in a international leadership position, by adoption of a cultural perspective to national development plans as a whole and building the cultural perspective into Australia's engagement with the Asia Pacific.

Council community development workers have a long history of facilitating community development and planning, consistently seeking to engage better with communities around decision-making relevant to local needs. Often this has implications for the balance struck between formal service provision and local community-led initiatives. Sometimes, the best way to ensure that groups exist to provide child care, preserve local history or start a sports team is to support local people to take on these roles themselves through the creation of small, community-owned organisations.
